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ugust Club Meeting

For the in-person meeting, the final order of business will be to select a venue for the evening meal.

ugust Club Dive, Redondo

We will be returning to Redondo for the August club dive. Our meet time is 10:00 AM on Saturday, August 20 and we plan to splash at 11:00 AM. There is usually plenty of parking, especially in the pay lot. This site is not current sensitive (at least most of the time) and there is usually a lot of life to see, including nudibranchs, wolf eels, gunnels, red octopus, and sometimes GPOs. This is also the site where a mola mola was seen on a dive. After everyone has rinsed and packed their gear, we will drive to Federal Way to have lunch at Jimmy Mac's Roadhouse.

Directions to Redondo:

Take I 5 to Exit 147 and head west on S 272nd St.

After about a mile the road curves left and changes name to Marine View Dr. Continue winding down the hill (road will change to 10^{th} and then 281^{st}).

At the waterfront, bear left on Beach Drive and proceed to the 3-way stop just past Salty's.

Turn left and park along the street for free or in the pay lot to your right. Entry for the dive is across the street from the northwest corner of the parking lot.
