Take I-5 to Highway 16 in Tacoma

Take Highway 16 West

Exit at Jackson Street

Make a left at the light at the end of the exit

Make the first right after crossing over 16 (6th Ave).

Follow 6th Ave road down to the water.

Find a good place to park.

If you put the Beach Tavern (8612 6th Ave, Tacoma) into Google maps you can use your phone to get there.

culpins

Spanky thought it might be good to have a short write up about sculpins, as these are fish we see on nearly every dive in Puget Sound and that we see often when tide pooling. Additionally, Sculpin is the name of an excellent beer made by Ballast Point Brewing. Sculpins are bottom-dwelling fish and

generally have large heads, large dorsal fins, and a short tapering body. They include one of Spanky's favorite fish, the Grunt Sculpin. Puget is also home to the world's largest sculpin, the Cabezon. Most sculpins are very well camouflaged and they tend to become very still in the presence of divers, which can make them hard to observe. They are also notoriously hard to identify. You can learn more about them and get a helpful identification guide for free by downloading Greg Jensen's sculpin book here.
