We will continue our pandemic routine of holding virtual meetings to begin the New Year. Our Zoom meeting will be held at 6:00 PM on Thursday, January 7. Our January Club Dive is scheduled for Sunday, January 24 at 11:30 AM. This will be a shallow dive where we will inspect the dock pilings and adjacent sandy areas for local sea life. We should have park facilities available. This is a fishing pier, so we will need to be on the lookout for fishing line. Also, we should have a dive flag, so if you have one please bring it along. Please remember to bring your Discover Pass, or be prepared to purchase a day pass at the park. If the weather looks good, bring along something to eat and we will reconvene to a picnic table at the park.

#### Directions to Illahee State Park:

The park is located about 5 miles north of the Bremerton Ferry Dock. From the Kingston Ferry, follow Hwy 104 to Striebel's Corner and continue straight ahead on Hwy 307/Bond Rd. Continue on Hwy 307 until you get to Poulsbo and turn right on Hwy 305. After about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile you take the ramp to go south on Hwy 3. Continue about 7 mi. and take the exit to Hwy 303 S/NE Waaga Way. Go about 6 mi. and turn left onto NE Riddell Road, which will turn to the right and become

We also did a tour of the Obstacle Course, which is designed to test your buoyancy and

finning control. A very enjoyable December dive, with decent weather.
