Directions to South Day Street Park:

Take I-5 to I-90 and head east, toward Bellevue. Take Exit 3, Ranier Avenue from I-90; Immediately get into the left lane and take the first left on S. Massachusetts St. Continue east on S. Massachusetts a block past the traffic circle and turn right on 29th Ave. S. Turn left at the next block onto S. Massachusetts St. and turn left again on 31st Ave. S. Head north to S. Atlantic St. and turn right. Take another right onto 32nd Ave. S. and turn left when you get to S. Massachusetts St. Continue straight for several blocks and turn left on Lakeside Ave. S. Head north until you get beneath the westbound bridge for I-90 and turn right into the South Day St. Park. You can also set Google Maps to South Day St. Park.

onus Dive Report

The bonus dive at the Tubular Reef was a good one. The rain stopped as we began to suit up and did not restart until we headed into the water. The surface was fortunately calm, considering a significant breeze was forecast. Visibility was outstanding - at least 30 feet. We headed out from shore to get some depth and then hung a left towards the pipeline. Pretty quickly we came across the elongated rock pile that had a lot of life. There were many Leopard Dorid and Sea Lemon nudibranchs, as well as lingcod guarding massive egg masses and lots of Red Rock, Dungeness and Kelp crabs. After we left the end of the reef we continued on, coming across islands of plumose anemones in the sandy bottom and eventually finding the end of the pipeline. There were lots of large kelp crabs all over the rocks that cover the pipeline. We hung out there for a bit, alas no Grey Whales swam by. On the way back there were fields of sea pens, a perfect White Lined Dirona, and a tire that was full of shrimp. One of the large shrimp would allow us to pet it. By the time we surfaced, the dive had lasted 75 minutes.
