Pune Club Meeting

For the second year in a row, the club will travel to the Olympic Peninsula for a June dive at Point Whitney. We will meet at 12:00 PM on Saturday, June 11 and will enter the water at 1:00 PM. This dive site has an easy entry, plenty of parking, and restroom facilities. The dive is along an underwater pipeline that includes 2 or 3 GPO dens. We usually see lots of rockfish, ling cod, plumose anemones, and nudibranchs. Be sure to bring your Washington Discover Pass. It is NOT possible to purchase one at the dive site. After the dive we will head north to Quillbilly's in Quilcene for a late lunch.

#### Directions to Point Whitney:

the evening meal.

You need to get across to the Peninsula. If you take the Edmonds-Kingston or Seattle-Bainbridge ferry, take Highway 104 across the Hood Canal Bridge and go South on Center Road (about 10 miles west of the Hood Canal Bridge). You will exit to the right to go south on Center Road. Continue south on Center Road until it joins Highway 101 in Quilcene. Continue south on Highway 101 for about 8.5 miles and watch for Bee Mill Road on your left (it should be shortly after you pass Hjelvick Rd). There is a left turn lane. Turn left on Bee Mill Road and continue for about 1.5 miles where Bee Mill Road turns left and Point Whitney Road continues straight. Go straight on Point Whitney Road and take it about 1 more mile where it ends

at the park. There is a parking lot to your left, past the boat launch. If you are coming from the south on Highway 101, watch for Bee Mill Road on your right about 4.5 miles north of Brinnon. It should be about a half mile past the southern intersection with Hjelvick Rd (this road does a loop from Hwy 101). You can enter Point Whitney Water Access to Google Maps for directions to the boat launch.

Seven divers showed up at Saltwater State
Park for an invigorating surface swim and a
pleasant dive on the artificial reef. We entered the
water during a fairly low tide and had an interesting
walk over several sandbars before we could don our
fins, and then swam over a couple more sand bars on
our way to the buoys marking the underwater park.
Spanky used Google Maps and learned that the
walk/swim was almost 0.2 miles. We hit the current

just right and had a relaxing dive with several different nudibranchs, a couple very large ling cod, and some good sized rock fish.

Due to the unavailability of housing in August, we have scheduled our 2022 Dive/Camp weekend for September 30 to October 2. We will again be visiting Fort Worden State Park. renting the same Sergeant's Quarters that we did last year.
