#### 🛕 🛕 arch Club Dive: Fort Flagler

We tried to dive Fort Flagler in November and were stymied by fierce winds. We will try again on March 17. It will be the middle of the month, so March should be halfway on its transition from lion to lamb. As they did in November, Spanky believes that most members of the club have not done this dive site. The site consists of an artificial reef built from debris from demolition of a pier at the site. There are restroom facilities within walking distance from the site. Please remember to bring your Discover Pass or be prepared to buy a day pass. This is a current-sensitive site, so please arrive on time so we do our entry before slack. We plan to meet at the site at 9:45 AM. We will splash promptly at 10:45 AM. After the dive we will head over to the Finn River Cidery for some cider and lunch.

#### Directions to Fort Flagler Dive Site:

From Kingston, follow Hwy 104 from the ferry toward Port Gamble. Continue on 104 across the Hood Canal Bridge and take the first right after the bridge onto Paradise Bay Road. Follow Paradise Bay Rd for about 6 miles until you get to Oak Bay Rd in Port Ludlow. Turn right onto Oak Bay Road and continue for 8.5 miles and turn right only Hwy 116 (Flagler Rd). Follow Hwy 116 to Fort Flagler State Park. When you get to the park take the first road to the right (Wansboro Rd) and follow it until you come to the waterfront. Take a sharp right and follow the road past the gun battery to a parking area. From the Port Townsend ferry, take Hwy 19 south toward Port Hadlock. Turn left on Hwy 116 and follow the
