arch Club Dive - Keystone

For our March club dive we will return to Whidbey Island for a dive at the Keystone Jetty on Sunday, March 24. Our meet time for this dive is 10:40 AM for an entry time of 11:40 AM. As Spanky is sure everyone knows, this is a current-sensitive site, so please plan on arriving on time so we can be ready for the planned entry time. This is generally regarded as one of the best dive sites on the east side of Puget Sound. We should find lots of life, including GPOs and lots of other divers. You will need to either bring your Discover Pass or purchase a day pass to park for this dive. There are showers and rinse water at the park (assuming they are not still off for the winter). After the dive we will walk over to Callen's for lunch.

Directions to Keystone:

The dive site is located on Whidbey Island at the Fort Casey Beach, near the ferry terminal. You can either take the Mukilteo ferry to Whidbey Island or drive north to drive across the Deception Pass bridge.

From the Whidbey Island ferry dock, proceed North on WA-525 for 22.1 miles to the intersection with WA-20/Wanamaker Rd. Turn left on WA-20 and proceed for about 2 miles to the Keystone Spit Park, just before the ferry terminal. From the Deception Pass bridge, proceed south on WA-20 past Coupeville and follow the signs to the ferry terminal. The parking lot for the Fort Casey Beach is just past the ferry terminal. Park as close to the water as you can. You can also enter Fort Casey Beach into Google maps to have your phone give you directions.

ebruary Dive Report

We picked a nice grey and rainy day for our club dive at Fort Ward. A total of 3 intrepid divers

showed up to enjoy the rain and explore the area designated as an underwater park along Fort Ward. Fortunately, the water was calm in spite of wind warnings for the area. Visibility was OK, at about 20 feet. The Fort Ward Underwater Park appears to be a large area of sand and gravel, with depths comparable to the Edmonds Underwater Park. We saw too many White Line Dironas to count, but few other nudibranch species. We had a nice relaxing dive and we ended the dive at almost the same point we dropped.
