This dive is in a State Park, so remember to bring your Discover Pass. Spanky believes that you cannot purchase a pass at the dive site. Parking at the lower parking area is also limited. Depending on how many divers will be going, we may need to shuttle gear between the upper and lower parking areas. If you plan on doing this dive, please RSVP to Spanky via email no later than Friday, May 5. Potential critters at this site include GPO's, rockfish, greenlings, and ling cod. After the dive we will drive over to the Village Pizzeria in Langley for lunch.

#### Directions to Possession Point Fingers:

You can enter Possession Point Dive Site into Google Maps and have it plot your route.

From the Clinton Ferry Terminal:

Head west on Hwy 525. At about 1.5 miles turn left onto Deer Lake Road.

At about 3.2 miles, turn left onto Cultus Bay Rd.

After about 2.1 miles, Cultus Bay Rd. turns to the right but you need to continue straight onto Possession Rd. Follow Possession Rd. for about 2 miles and take a right turn onto Franklin Rd. Take Franklin to its end and park in the narrow parking area. A few cars will be able to

## pril Club Dive Report

A beautiful day in the Great Northwest! Super day to do the best dive in Puget Sound! Visibility was great and the current was moving. We rode through the pass, seeing tons of life. The wall was covered with barnacles, tube worms, dead man's fingers sponges and other creatures that are able to hold on and avoid flowing with the tide. Visibility was so good that the sun was casting shadows at 50 feet. After the dive, ESSDB Steve used his powered wheel barrow to transport gear up hill to the parking lot.

# Cool-?-of the Month Section Cool-Web-Articles-of-the-Month:

Spanky found an interesting article about research being conducted in the Salish Sea to try to learn why the number of Dungeness Crabs being harvested each year has been declining. The Salish Sea includes the Strait of Juan de Fuca, the waters extending south to Olympia, and the waters extending north into British Columbia (the Strait of Georgia). A few years ago, the Pacific Northwest Crab Research Group (consisting of government, tribal, and research and educational institutions) established a network of "light traps" to count juvenile crabs to add data on their numbers and distribution. The study was recently extended into the waters of Canada. You can read about it by clicking on Puget Sound and Canadian Crabs.

Our second cool web article is about deep diving research being conducted by the US Navy. They have developed a new lightweight suit capable of allowing a diver to go deep without requiring decompression and without the cumbersome weight and limited mobility associated with deep diving armor systems. The new system is currently rated for a maximum depth of 300 feet, but they are working on increasing the usable depth. Read it here.
