actoboo Club Dive

The club dive for the Month of Halloween will be at Redondo, our second south end dive in a row. We will meet on Saturday, 10/9/21 at 10:00 AM. This is one of the best shore dive sites in the Seattle area. The site is not current-sensitive, but please try to arrive on time. We will splash at 11:00 AM. There are restrooms close by and facilities to rinse your gear after the dive. We may visit the bottle field and hope to navigate to the fabled Volkswagen. The site is known for octopus (a total of 13 were once counted on a dive here), wolf eels, gunnels, and nudibranchs. We will also be on the lookout for any new structure that may have been added by the Washington Scuba Alliance to create a new artificial reef. Those willing to go to a restaurant will head over to Salty's for an after-dive lunch. We also may visit the MAST Center Aquarium after the dive. The aquarium is open until 2:00 PM on Saturdays.

Directions to Redondo:

From wherever you are, take I-5 towards Des Moines. You will exit at Exit 147 and head west on South 272nd St. Follow 272nd St. When you get to the top of the bluff the road curves to the left and becomes Marine View Drive. Continue down the hill. At the waterfront the road curves to the left and becomes Redondo Beach Drive S. Continue just past Salty's. At the stop sign you turn left. Park for free at an open spot along the street or enter the pay parking lot to your right

eptember Club Dive Report

Last month's club dive was at the artificial reef near the Les Davis Pier in Tacoma. We had an unusually cool fall day with some showers. Visibility was decent for this dive, about 15-20 feet. We had no trouble locating the artificial reef, and we saw the normal contingent of fish, giant plumose anemones, and lots of nudibranchs. Spanky also saw a good sized Lion's Mane jellyfish on the way back to shore. All-in-all, a very pleasant dive with but chilly fall weather.

ing Cod

All of us have encountered Ling Cod on our dives, especially those at the Edmonds Underwater Park, which is home to some very large ones. Ling cod (they actually are not cod but are greenlings) are only present in the Eastern Pacific ranging from Alaska to Baja California, and can grow to about 5 feet in length and weigh over 100 lb. They also can live for more than 30 years. During the club dive at Les Davis and at some other recent dives, Spanky has noticed an unusual abundance of blue ling cod. ESSDB Larry submitted a photo of one for this newsletter. It turns out that these fish can come in a variety of colors, including nearly black, golden, red spotted, and blue. Apparently the blue ones (reportedly called smurf cod in Alaska) may also have blue flesh. However, according to Sitka Salmon Shares, the blue flesh turns white when cooked.


